

Highlights about the LFCC Fauquier Campus – Spring 2016

Enrollment

- LFCC student headcount enrollment at FC grew 3.8% last year, from 1,795 in fall 2014 to 1,864 in fall 2015 representing 26.6% of the LFCC total of 7,002.
- In the ten years since 2005 when there were 1,175 students, FC has grown 58.6%. Middletown enrollment has grown 19.0% in during same time period.
- The FC served an estimated 1,005 full-time equivalent (FTE) students or 26.3% of the estimated LFCC total of 3,828 FTE.
- Approximately 22.9% of FC students were full-time, 60.2% are female, and 13.3% were first-time in college for the fall 2015 semester – with Middletown campus showing 28.3% full-time, 61.4% female and 16.3% first-time in college.
- Approximately 78.3% of FC students were White/Caucasian, 5.7% Black/African American, 8.2% Hispanic, 2.0% Asian, 0.3% Native American, 0.1% Hawaiian/Alaskan Native, and 0.4% Unknown/Other. This is in contrast to the Middletown campus, which had 4.3% Black/African American and 80.4% White/Caucasian.
- Approximately 55.4% of FC students were served on-campus, up slightly from 54.1% for Middletown. The off-campus enrollment of 832 includes 631 dual enrolled students.
- The 631 Dual enrolled (DE) students make up 26.8% of all DE enrollment. They represent 33.9% of the 1,864 total students at FC, comparable to Middletown where DE makes up 33.6%.
- The top three dual enrollment high schools in fall 2015 for FC were Kettle Run High School (248), Fauquier High School (159), and Liberty High School (92).
- Of the 1,233 FC students who are not in dual enrollment, 207 attended Liberty High School, 179 Fauquier High School, 98 Culpepper High School, and 96 Kettle Run High School.
- The jurisdictions for students served by FC include Fauquier County (1,189 or 63.8%), Culpeper County (240, 12.9%), Rappahannock County (106, 5.7%), Prince William County (74, 4.0%), Warren County (29, 1.6%), Winchester (22, 1.2%), Frederick (20, 1%), Shenandoah (17, 1%), Page County (17, 1%), Clarke (14, .8%), Loudoun County (13, .7%), and Fairfax County (12, .6%).
- The majority of FC students are working towards the AA&S & AS transfer degree (41.3%), followed by non-degree studies (40.2%) which includes DE, AAS (9.2%), certificates (7.9%), and career studies

certificates (1.4%).

- In terms of major programs of FC students, these include transfer programs in general studies including concentrations in human services, administration of justice and recreation/outdoor leadership (18.1%), science including concentrations in agriculture science, computer science, engineering and health professions (9.1%), business administration (5.6%), liberal arts including concentrations in communication and philosophy and fine arts (5.4%) and education (3.1%); as well as the health science certificate (2.7%).

Awards

- A total of 327 of the estimated 1,536 LFCC awards in 2015-16 were to FC students (21.3%). The 327 awards include 141 AA&S and AS, 36 AAS, 130 certificates, and 20 career studies certificates. This represents a 122.4% increase over the 147 FC awards given in 2005-06.

Courses

- A total of 519 course sections were offered by the FC in fall 2015, including labs. These classes served 6,072 student seats.
- Approximately 192 sections (37%) of these involved online, compressed video, or hybrid delivery. These classes enroll 2,502 students or 41.2% of the total FC course enrollment.
- A total of 311 online class sections were offered over the spring 2015, summer 2015, and fall 2015 semesters serving 4,978 student seats.
- The largest online enrollments in fall 2015 were in HLT (229), ENG (182), CST (163), BIO (161), PSY (156), and ECO (110).
- Among all delivery modes, the highest enrollments in fall 2015 are ENG (772), BIO (741), HIS (598), MTH (425), MTE (331), HLT (269), PLS (265), CST (262), SDV (256), and PSY (234).

FC Trends

- LFCC increased noticeably (169.4%) between fall 1990 and fall 2015. However, service to Fauquier County students by both campuses has increased 912.5%, from 120 students in fall 1990 to 1,215 in fall 2013.
- According to SCHEV Residency Reports, 33.2% or 1,214 of all Fauquier County residents going to college in fall 2015 went to LFCC. Another 420 (11.5%) went to NVCC, 344 (9.4%) to George Mason, 260 (7.1%) to Virginia Tech, 187 (5.1%) to JMU, 133 (3.6%) to Liberty, 127 (3.5%) to VCU, and 106 (2.9%) to Radford.
